10th Annual CSP Conference draws a large crowd at Martha's Choice Community Farm

More than 300 people attended the 10th Annual CSP Conference and 45th Annual Mental Health Awards Ceremony held last month in Audubon at Martha's Choice Community Farm.

The event was held outdoors from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on May 23, 2023 under blue skies filled with plenty of sunshine. After opening remarks by Pam Howard, Administrator of the Montgomery County Dept. of Health and Human Services, Office of MH/DD/EI, the morning kicked off with Educational and Wellness Workshops.

A Tai Chi workshop was held by Mitch Goldfarb who has shared his joy of movement every year since the conference began. Goldfarb is a professor at West Chester University in the Kinesi-ology Department. He also leads Corporate Wellness and Mindfulness Programs in the business community. Participants in his workshop found peace, centeredness and a calming energy as they executed slow movements combined with slow, rhythmic breathing.

Tony Mascara, of World Drums, took folks on a rhythmic journey using different drums and other instruments from around the world during his session called "The Power of Rhythm, Sound & Silence." Participants learned about the history of how certain drums are made, their original purpose and reason for being created, and where the drums have migrated to in our musical world today.

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Individuals and teams win Recovery and Resiliency Awards

Seven individuals and 2 teams were honored with Recovery and Resiliency Awards at the 45th Annual Mental Health Awards Reception held on May 23, 2023 at Martha's Choice Community Farm in Audubon, PA.

The award recipients were recognized for their exemplary efforts

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and accomplishments that extend beyond the typical expectations of job description, role or position. The winners have either demonstrated exceptional personal accomplishment and resiliency, set positive examples for others, or shown outstanding dedication in their support of recovery for persons in pursuit of mental wellness.

Montgomery County Commissioners Kenneth E. Lawrence Jr. and Jamila H. Winder presented the awards to the winners during the annual Mental Health Awards Ceremony. Here are the winners:

Adrienne Kosinski, has been an Assistant Public Defender in Montgomery County for several years. During that time, she has represented numerous children who have juvenile court involvement. Throughout this time, Adrienne has shown herself to be an ardent advocate for children's rights, using a trauma-informed approach to Public Defense. There have been multiple instances where families have shared that Adrienne made herself readily available to youth and their families, and explained things in a way that helped them understand the juvenile court process and alleviated their fears. She has been involved in multiple community programs and panels, which are aimed at increasing awareness about juvenile justice issues. Adrienne has the ability to be the greatest professional while still being mindful of the fears and worries many parents experience when their children are faced with delinquency. Her system knowledge, professionalism, dedication, and commitment to being a champion for children's rights are some of the reasons Adrienne is receiving a Recovery and Resiliency Award.



Ann Connaghan is a Blended Case Manager at Merakey. She primarily supports children and transition-aged youth, and has been in the position for many years. Ann is a remarkable and dedicated support for many children and families in Montgomery County, and has a special talent for working with families who are facing complex challenges navigating the child-serving systems. Folks who work alongside Ann over the years have all ways been impressed with her strengthsbased and collaborative approach. She supports families and youth to become their own best self-advocates, and ensures that their preferences and goals are clearly heard during meetings. Ann goes above and beyond for many families, including supporting them with things well outside of her expected scope of work, such as spending multiple hours teaching one mother how to navigate her cell phone and computer so that she could help support her child's remote learning during the pandemic. Ann often works with incredibly challenging situations, and always treats everyone involved with dignity, respect, and kindness. She collaborates magnificently with community partners, and is always looking for opportunities to connect others to resources and support.

The Community Satisfaction Team (CST) consists of individuals with lived experiences who have chosen to work in the field to improve the experiences of others. CST engages with individuals receiving mental health supports and services by conducting surveys to find out feedback and what they think about the services they are receiving within Montgomery County. CST does an extraordinary job actively listening to tough experiences/stories and grievances while still exhibiting grace, compassion, and being there for the individual. For these reasons, and many more, CST is

receiving a Recovery and Resiliency Award. CST The Christina Jordan and her fantastic team at the Coordinated Homeless Outreach Center (CHOC) has managed to keep services available and going for the most vulnerable

individuals in Montgomery County. The people supported by the CHOC have known the trauma of homelessness, and many have struggled with loss, trauma, and emotional distress prior to and during their housing crisis. In a new environment, with new neighbors, Christina and her team have pulled together to help people who have mostly been brought into an unfamiliar neighborhood, and helped them to

progress towards finding a new home and achieving their goals. Throughout the recent changes, the CHOC team has main-



tained its values of supporting people with dignity and respect. Their steadfastness and flexibility during a very stressful year has been an inspiration to all. An immense thank you to Christina and the entire CHOC team for all they have and all they do! Congratulations on your award!

Erin Seifrit-Townsend is the Deputy Administrator for Children's Mental Health and embodies the tenants of how to holistically approach the mental wellness of children in every decision and interaction she has related to her work and leadership. Erin is systems-focused and reliably ensures consideration for children's services through the continuum of prevention through treatment. Recently, Erin secured a multi-million dollar allocation of ARPA funds to support school based Behavioral Health programming, motivated by the priority of supporting kids in their districts and communities. Through her passion, drive, dedication and determination, she has fostered collaborative relationships with all of the school districts in Montgomery County, always keeping the idea of "no wrong door" at the forefront of all she does. Erin also embodies Child and Adolescent Service System program (CASSP) principles by promoting child-centered, family-focused, community based services for



every child in Montgomery County. She is steadfast in her ability to always remain trauma informed in our work and will always put others ahead of herself. Her dedication to supporting programming and services that work collaboratively with families to help keep children safe in their homes and communities is unparalleled. Erin consistently recognizes and supports the value of peer support and mutuality while simultaneously acknowledging the importance and value of clinical services and other formal supports for children. Erin models collaborative practices in everything she does and often goes above and beyond in order to connect families to help that helps. She has positivity that is conta-

gious, and you cannot help but smile when in her presence. It is for these reasons, and so many more, Erin is receiving a Recovery and Resiliency Award.

Gene Paliescheskey, Community Development and Integration Coordinator at CommunityWorx, consistently goes above and beyond when addressing the needs of individuals in the community and at Hopeworx. He recently was instrumental in securing hundreds of toys for the HopeWorx toy drive over this past holiday season. He also assisted with the cleanup of an apartment for an individual he supported so that they would no longer be experiencing homelessness. He is always somehow able to pull together resources from the community and other providers on very short notice, and he does it all with a smile on his face. He helps folks with resources to help with food, clothes, and information. He is also never too busy to support his fellow coworkers. He is kind and thoughtful and is always helping or giving back in some way. He is very reliable, has knowledge on an abundance of resources, and above all else, is humble and never gives up. He has and continues to make a difference in so many people's lives. For these reasons, Gene is receiving a Recovery and Resiliency Award!





Lydia Schooley is amazing in every way! She consistently works towards stomping out stigma both for the overall peer profession as well as for the individuals she supports. Lydia has gone beyond to ensure everyone is eligible for peer support and she celebrates the resiliency of folks with lived experience on a daily basis. Lydia is quick to offer encouragement and support whenever and where ever it is needed, even if the person does not work with her. Lydia is a true advocate and she walks this path with such humility. She is such a kind and compassionate individual who is so supportive to all she comes across! Thank you Lydia, and congratulations on your award!

Sergeant Mark Huzzard is a kind, smart, and thoughtful contributor to the overall wellness of the Montgomery County Community. Specific to mental health, he has worked

diligently in support of several projects worth highlighting. First is his role in supporting the 3 treatment/diversion courts in Montgomery County. Sergeant. Huzzard truly believes in the power of diversion and of people's ability to recover and live good lives. His presence brings additional dignity to the court process, and he often connects in a way with participants that

brings them hope and helps them feel valued. Sergeant Huzzard has been a leader in his office in implementing a Pathfinder program. This program involves training sheriff's deputies in Crisis Intervention Specialist skills, and pairs trained and empathetic deputies with individuals presenting to the courthouse who may be confused, scared, or just in need of a supportive/friendly face. Sergeant Huzzard himself is trained in these skills and has employed them during his time in warrant service, where he is able to engage with folks on a human level and help them navigate what they need to do in



the criminal justice system while keeping them and everyone around them safe. Sergeant Huzzard is also a military Veteran, and has played an essential role in the development of the Montgomery County Veterans Response Team (the first in the state!). Launching the team was his idea, and through his contacts at the Coatesville VA, with law enforcement, and beyond, he has been key to the success of the team. Sergeant Huzzard embodies the values of understanding the impact of trauma, and the power of peer support (the core value of the VRT is veterantoveteran/peer-to-peer engagement). He advocates for the mental health needs of people in crisis, and is compassionate and kind. For these reasons, Sergeant Huzzard is receiving an award.

Troy Foster works for Access Services in the Montgomery County Mobile Crisis Program. Troy has supported many individuals while being a Crisis Worker. In the past, Troy supported an individual who reported Troy was so calm, patient, kind, non-judgmental, and easy to talk with. At that moment, this individual felt so low and as if they did not have anybody in their corner or anyone to talk to. However, Troy was such a fantastic support and connected them to resources and followed up and texted them after they met to provide additional resources and to see how they were doing. This individual expressed that they finally felt heard because Troy took the time to sit with them, actively listen, and validate their thoughts and feelings. This is one example of Troy's amazing work. We thank Troy for all his work he does as a Crisis Worker, supporting folks in their darkest and hardest moments.

Also recognized during the ceremony was **Justin Chamrin** who received the

CSP Ambassador Award. Justin has been an active member of both Montgomery County CSP and Southeast Regional CSP for the last several years, and this year, he stepped up to co-chair the Advocacy Subcommittee for the Southeast Regional Committee, and also was very active with the Montgomery County CSP Advocacy Subcommittee, speaking up at the meetings, and helping to promote the CSP Needs Assessment conducted by the committee.




Justin has shown dedication and a passion for lifting the voices of the CSP community. His advocacy and peer support models the CSP principles every day.

Another part of the program included recognition by the county Office of Mental Health of individuals and their affiliated organizations for their commitment to pursuing knowledge, skills and creating a recovery focused system of care, as demonstrated by working toward the completion of the **Montgomery County Four-Part Trauma Informed Care training series.**

To date, almost 800 people have completed classes in the trauma series, with over 80 completing the 24-hour series. This year, 44 individuals participated in

three sessions of the four-part training series and the county is looking forward to many of them completing the



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

OMHSAS MENTAL HEALTH PLANNING COUNCIL (MHPC) LOOKING FOR NEW MEMBERS

Good afternoon OMHSAS Stakeholders,

The Office of Mental Health & Substance Abuse Services (OMHSAS) is accepting applications for new members to serve on the Mental Health Planning Council (MHPC). The MHPC's purpose is to advise OMHSAS on a broad behavioral mandate to include, but not be limited to, mental health, substance abuse, behavioral health disorders, and cross-system ability to fulfill the federal requirements of the Community Mental Health Services Block Grant (CMHSBG). The MHPC helps the Commonwealth live up to its stated commitment to quality, meaningful, recovery-oriented behavioral healthcare for citizens wanting wellness and wholeness.

Three (3) MHPC Committees seek applicants:

- the Children's Behavioral Health Committee;
- the Adult Behavioral Health Committee; and
- the Older Adult Behavioral Health Committee.

Because vacancies are available on three (3) committees, you will be asked to rank your priority of committee appointment by 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , or 3^{rd} choice. Please note that you may not receive your 1st priority selection. Also, if you had previously submitted a MHPC Committee Member application, we would ask you to reapply as previously submitted applications are unrecoverable due to technical issues.

To be considered for an Appointment by OMHSAS Deputy Secretary Jennifer Smith, one must meet the following requirements as shared in the Protocols which govern the work of the MHPC:

- Must be a current resident of Pennsylvania or be able to document substantial current involvement in the Pennsylvania mental health system (Membership, Section II, C. of Protocols) and
- Reflect the cultural and geographic diversity of individuals served in the Commonwealth and maintain an equitable representation among individuals who have received services, family, advocate, and professional representatives to the fullest extent possible (Membership, Section II, B. of Protocols)

Montgomery County Announces 2023 Juneteenth Events

NORRISTOWN, PA – Montgomery County and community organizations are hosting several events over the next week to celebrate Juneteenth, which marks the end of slavery in the U.S. Although the Emancipation Proclamation took effect in 1863, it was not until June 19, 1865 that enslaved people in Texas were finally freed. A full listing of events can be found at www.montgomerycountypa.gov/Juneteenth.

On Thursday, June 15, 2023, at 1 p.m., Montgomery County will hold its 2nd Annual Juneteenth flag-raising ceremony at the Montgomery County Courthouse, on the corner of Swede and Airy Streets in Norristown. The event will feature remarks from the Montgomery County Commissioners and other local officials, a reading of Emancipation Proclamation, and recognition of the winners of the 2023 Art and Prose of Freedom Contest. This event is open to the public.

The Peter Wentz Farmstead in Lansdale will offer special tours on Saturday, June 17 and Sunday, June 18, 2023, focusing on the lives of the enslaved people owned by the Wentz family and how their stories connect to the larger history of slavery in early Pennsylvania. Learn about Jack, a freedom seeker owned by Peter Wentz who escaped twice from the Farm-



stead. Hear the stories of Hannah Till and William Lee, enslaved people who were brought here with General George Washington during the Philadelphia Campaign. Immerse yourself in the 18th century as you discover the complicated and rarely told history of slavery in Pennsylvania. The Peter Wentz Farmstead is a National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom site. Tours will run every half hour throughout the weekend and space is limited. For tour times and more information, click here to reserve a timed ticket.

<u>Pottsgrove Manor</u> in Pottstown invites the public on Saturday, June 17, 2023, from noon to 2 p.m. to honor the history of the black experience in America. Learn about the important work of the Friends of the African Union Church of South Coventry and trace the roots of free Black ironworkers of Coventry Forge. Stay and help with a volunteer cleanup of the historic African Union Church of South Coventry cemetery. No registration is required to attend.

Abby said Governor Shapiro is forming a task force to address mental health parity compliance with insurance companies. Inspections and exams to make sure insurance companies are following parity. If you experienced that your private insurance isn't covering your mental health like physical health. There's a number to call. Private insurance doesn't cover peer specialists or crisis. We have an excellent mobile crisis in this county. It's only paid for with public mental health dollars not private insurance. If private insurance companies paid for crisis services, we would have more money to spend on other services needed in the county.

Community Outreach Subcommittee: Scholarships for the conference in October. Grants for flag football. \$75 and there's a matching source. A request for a celebration for Juneteenth was approved. A gas card for mom on disability and her daughter going to therapy was approved.

CSP Subcommittees:

At the direction of the CSP Committee, the Advocacy Subcommittee gathers information on issues, plans advocacy events and creates a monthly newsletter to provide information to the stakeholder network as well as the community at large about the work of CSP.
